# Understanding The Times

From the moment I became born again 43 years ago, I have been hearing "we are in the last days." Literalist that I was, I took that to mean any day now Jesus would be coming back. I, and everyone else I knew at the time, was so sure I'd be hearing at any moment that trumpet blast announcing His return, that it became a primary reason I didn't finish college to get a degree. After all, who needs a degree in heaven!

After all this time, Jesus still has not made His second appearance (at least, I don't think I missed it!), so the Church awaits, albeit more anxiously at some times than at others, His return. There's hardly a day goes by that I'm not reading about some sign of the time that continues to indicate the Bride should be in readiness for her Groom. It always seems imminent. Yet, comparing what's taking place in our present-day culture with where the Church is in its response to the times, it hardly seems like we're anywhere close to being ready. This is unfortunate! Maybe the Church can learn some things from the tribe of Issachar to equip ourselves better, that we may have a greater influence and impact on our culture "in these last days."

We don't know a great deal about Issachar and his tribe. He was the ninth of Jacob's sons, the fifth he had with Leah. However, In Moses' blessing over the tribes, he speaks over Issachar, "And of Zebulun he said, 'Rejoice, Zebulun, in your going forth, and Issachar, in your tents. They shall call peoples to the mountain; there they shall offer righteous sacrifices; for they shall draw out the abundance of the seas, and the hidden treasures of the sand." Deut. 33:18,19 This passage seems to compliment well the meditation passage above, speaking to the calling and value of Issachar's tribe's contribution to their culture.

As the Body of Christ on earth, if we are to be of any relevance to the culture, if we are to achieve and maintain any influence over it towards holy righteousness, we must understand the times. And, as the old Bob Dylan song tells us, "The times, they are a-changin'." To me, that means the Church must be willing to change the nuances and methods of our presentation of the Good News, as well! And therein lies the rub! It seems, overall, we have gotten stuck in our ruts. Different denominations believe different doctrines and create different customs from one another, and actively teach that others' relationships to God are wrong, in error, or

no longer valid past the days of the apostle-led early church. Biblical unity among the brethren has nearly become a thing of the past, as we pick apart other groups' dynamics. I don't see where the Colossian Church criticized the Corinthians for their carnality and the need to be taught about loving God's way. Or where the Church at Rome (with that city's great military empire) chastised the Ephesians for not knowing about the armor of God metaphor.

Though it has become grossly cliché-ish, considering "What would Jesus do?" may not a bad beginning to bringing about the re-shift the Church needs to make again to regain the cultural relevancy it once had. I have no doubt that each group would put forth a different version of what that looks like in understanding the times. But I think that's OK. Everyone responds in different ways to different methods, so we don't all have to be the same.

What we do need to do, though, is stop criticizing one denomination over another, stop idolizing certain congregations and leaders, stop labeling other groups as heretics or "preaching a different gospel" because we happen to disagree with their style or methods or how they are inclusive of those we don't accept, stop being threatened by another church's accomplishments. Rather, we can explore outside our denominational walls, welcome joint ministry with other expressions of Christianity, pray **for** one another, pray **with** one another, embrace para-church ministries which may have anointing and expertise beyond our congregational experience, make it just as important in our own lives to put on a heart of a disciple who learns as it is to carry the heart of a teacher who instructs. If we can do these things and more, maybe the unchurched culture will begin to see the Church's relevance again. Maybe they will again say, as was said about the early Church, "See how they love one another," instead of noting how we snipe at one another. The narrow way to the Father, the Door, is Jesus. About that, there can be no diversity. We don't need to make the methods of making disciples as narrow as we have up 'til now. The Holy Spirit is a big God; He can handle the task. The question is, "Is the <u>Church</u> up for the task?" We'll see.
