ABBA'S DELIGHT

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THIS MONTH'S MEDITATION SCRIPTURE: Then on that day David first assigned Asaph and his relatives to give thanks to the Lord. Oh give thanks to the Lord, call upon His name; Make known His deeds among the peoples. Sing to Him, sing praises to Him; Speak of all His wonders (wonderful acts). I Chron. 16:7-9.

Season of Thanksgiving?

Growing up, I was not one who would readily say "Thank you" to someone who had done something for me, or shown me a kindness. It certainly wasn't from a lack of training; my parents, especially my Dad, would regularly remind me to be grateful and to thank people who had gone out of their way to be of some kind of service to me and my family. Whether I was the recipient of a gift or a ride or a favor done, I would always be asked if I had said "Thank you." Most of the time I would say that I had offered that proper response, even when it wasn't true.

Somewhere along the way of life, my Dad's words began taking root and growing in me. Looking back now, I suspect the change began to take place slowly when I first surrendered my life to the Lord and became born again. I caught a glimpse of the sacrifice Jesus paid for my/our sins, and Father began developing in me a thankful heart, first toward Him and then branching out from there to others. Much later, I began to realize through the Scriptures that God desires in me a life poised toward Him in thankfulness, not just the occasional "Thank you" spoken in response to one of those kindnesses or provisions, and especially not only during the Thanksgiving holiday we celebrate now every year as a nation.

One of Father's family traits I want to be known for is being a man who has a thankful heart. I desire to cultivate a life of gratefulness regardless of my daily circumstances. I want to be found in thankfulness in my personal life, at work, in ministry. I always want to remember Who is my source, and my strength and to be thankful to Him. I desire to be faithful in thanking God for what I do have, not being discontent about what I don't have.

And I have further realized that Father does not want me to be silent in my thanksgiving. The passage above encourages us to "make known His deeds among the peoples," as we express our thanks to Him with spoken words and songs.

So today I take this opportunity to declare to you my thankfulness to my Father for sending Jesus as the sacrifice for the sin of the world (of which I believe I am personally responsible for about 50% of the total); I am thankful for the Holy Spirit leading and guiding my life in His truth; I am grateful for being saved out of a life of sexual addiction and homosexuality, and for sobriety; I am thankful to Father for creating me a male (because I wasn't always happy about that) and for having come to the place in my life where I have seen masculinity restored in areas the enemy had stolen from me—an ongoing process; I am grateful that Father called me to be a husband and father, and I am grateful for my wife Fran and our twenty-five years together, and for my sons Isaac, Sam, and Joel with whom the Lord has blessed me (He has used them all greatly in that restoring process); I am thankful for the two church families in which the Lord has planted my natural family over the years—the lines have truly fallen to us in pleasant places; I am

grateful to Father for ministry after many years of being on the shelf and fearing I would never be productive for His Kingdom; I am thankful for the lives of men Father brought into my life to influence me towards righteousness, and for the lives of men whom the Lord has allowed me to influence as I have been; I am grateful for my career in credit and collections that has spanned thirty years; I am grateful for the Body of Christ and how I am realizing more and more that we have so far to go in learning from the Spirit how to relate to, encourage, support, and care for one another.

Let's face it! There is enough in our lives by Father's hand that should cause us to express our thankfulness "without ceasing." May we always be found with a grateful heart as we live to serve our King!
