

## Are We Proud About Our Pride?

Recently, I have been thinking a lot about pride; more so than I have before. I have become increasingly more uncomfortable with the idea of being proud of, or about, things in life as I have observed different expressions of pride in our culture.

"Is there a good kind of pride?" I asked myself. Our culture seems to think so. We have national pride, gay pride, pride in our favorite sports team, and pride in our own or our children's accomplishments. In recent decades, a trend among mental health professionals and educators has been for them to encourage parents to instill pride in their children so as to not leave room for any hurt feelings. But what does God say about our pride?

I pulled out my Cruden's Complete Concordance and counted nearly a hundred separate Scripture passages referring to the words pride, proud and proudly. You know what I discovered? Not one of those examples of pride in the Bible portrays it in a good light.

Then I started thinking about different scenarios in the Scriptures in both the Old and New Testaments when it seemed God or the people involved might have had cause to be proud about something. There is no mention of Abraham being proud when Isaac, the son of promise, was finally born to him and Sarah. And he certainly would have cause to be proud of siring a son at around a hundred years old, wouldn't he? Moses could have displayed some pride coming down from Mount Sinai, after having received the ten commandments from the hand of God Himself. Instead, he was angered at the behavior of the Israelites. In the New Testament, Joseph and Mary could have taken on a prideful manner when they presented Jesus for circumcision in the temple and received those amazing attentions toward their Son from Simeon and Anna praising God for the birth of the Savior of the world. Or when Zacchaeus was favored with the Lord's presence in his home to share a meal, he could have bragged all about town of his good fortune. Rather, he responded to God's conviction of his hurtful behaviors by restoring with generosity what he had stolen from Jewish citizens. Finally, when Jesus was baptized by John the Baptist in the Jordan River, God's voice could have shouted, "Way to go,

Jesus! I'm proud of You, Son!" Instead, He said, "This is My beloved Son, in whom I am well-pleased." I like that difference. It may be subtle, but it seems to be an important one.

I believe that is where we should take our cue. As I think about my accomplishments along my life's journey so far, I'd much rather hear Father say to me, "What you have done pleases Me," or "I love how you ministered My love to that young man." I think I'll begin trying that with my own sons.

I don't think it is pleasing to God, but it is very common church government. So- press on, God knows your heart towards ministry. I think you have to follow the Holy Spirit and what you know to produce fruit in the lives of people struggling with homosexuality. Ministers with a lack of knowledge should yield to your leadership, but I understand the conflict with that idea. As a leader, they want to control things. You are in a tough place, brother. But remember in the end, we only need to please Him.

From a Christian counselor: Daniel, I agree with your position in this issue. Forced attendance rarely produces heart conviction. It can happen, but it is much better to approach it your way. Keep up the good work.

From a missionary friend: Daniel, What a wise, godly, biblical, Spirit-led policy for helping those with same-sex attraction honestly and realistically deal with this issue, because they want to find victory rather than "victory" imposed upon them. You are exactly right in your irenic and loving approach to both those struggling with SSA and those who care for them, both parents and pastors. May God continue to bless the ministry of Abba's Delight!
