THIS MONTH'S MEDITATION SCRIPTURE: Children, be obedient to your parents in all things, for this is well-pleasing to the Lord. Fathers, do not exasperate your children, that they may not lose heart. Colossians 3:20,21

Fathers and Sons

As I am writing this piece, my Dad is dying. He has been in the late stages of dementia for some time, and has now developed aspiration pneumonia. There are no heroic measures being taken, according to his wishes, and that includes a feeding tube. It's a matter of hours to days at this point. To some degree, I have already begun my grieving process.

Dad was a very likable guy according to everyone who met him, and his personality suited him well enough as a salesman to get promoted later to District Sales Manager. Unfortunately, that's not the Dad I was able to see.

Dad and I have had a life-long complicated relationship. Growing up, in my mind I questioned his love for me. In my adult years, I began to realize some things about Dad and how he expressed love. He was from a generation that was known for not verbally expressing love to its offspring. That a roof was provided, that there was food on the table, and that there were clothes on our backs were expected to be enough of a love expression that it didn't need to be said. Back then, nobody knew about love languages, and Dad didn't feel the need to tell me he loved me. And I couldn't see it.

It's been said that males need the three A's: attention, affirmation, and affection. For decades, it had been my perception that these needs in my life were neglected by my Dad. In truth, they were not. But, for me as a child, my perception was my reality. So, in my adult years as I began to gain a more realistic perspective, I realized that my Dad really did love me, and that he did his best to meet the needs of those three A's in my life. By that time, though, I had dug a hole deep enough for myself in my relationship with him that I spent years trying to dig out of.

My wife has reminded me on several occasions of something Dad said to me the day that she and I disclosed my homosexual history to Dad and Mom, and my siblings and their spouses during a family meeting I had called when I was preparing to begin active ministry to those with same-sex attractions and their families. At the end of the conversation, Dad said, "I've always been proud of you, but now I respect you, too." We have never gotten to where I would have wished it could be, and over the years the Lord brought a lot of healing to our relationship. Yet, in my grieving, I am realizing already I am mourning the loss of what will never be maybe even more than grieving him himself. I knew with his dementia, as time went on, this would be the case, but with his impending death, it becomes final. We were both incapable, for whatever reasons, of giving and receiving certain things with each other in our relationship.

I was talking with one of my sons yesterday, after his trip to say good-bye to his grandfather, about the fact that because of how I perceived my Dad the way I did, I raised him and his brothers being intentional about how my wife and I expressed our love to them as they were growing up. God is a God of redemption, and I trust that there is future healing both for me in my relationship with my Dad even after he's gone, and for my sons in their relationship with me.

Fathers, and prospective fathers, let us be intentional going forward with our sons to discover how they receive love best and to sow into those needs.
